AREA HISTORY

Grundy County's recorded history began in the early 1800's. The first settlers in Grundy county were General W.P. Thompson and his family, who arrived in 1833. General Thompson's home still stands today, located in Crowder State Park, along the Thompson River. About a year after Thompson settled, Levi Moore and his family arrived, and the area soon after became known as "Moore's Settlement". In 1838 the first store opened in what was then called Lomax.

Grundy County was organized in 1841 with set boundaries. The county was named for Felix Grundy, Tennessee senator and United States attorney general under President Jackson. In 1857, the county seat of Grundy County - Trenton, was born. The first court in Grundy County was held in a log house in Trenton (known then as Lomax Store).

One of the county's main businesses from 1873 to 1943 was mining. There were three different coal mines in the area, along with a major railroad, which helped the mining industry thrive.

The current courthouse (cover photo) was built in 1903, and is still in excellent condition. Grundy County is classified as a third class county with a township form of government. The current assessed valuation is over \$131 million for a population of around 10,197 (according to the 2010 census). Grundy County encompasses over 437 square miles, and has an agriculturalbased economy.

Trenton is the seat of Grundy County in the heart of the Green Hills of North Central Missouri. Industry, education, agriculture and retail trade make up the economic base of our lovely community.

The low cost of living makes it a desirable community for people of every age. Trenton is the area hub for shopping, dining, and entertainment. The downtown area is being revitalized with new shops. The shopping district includes traditional shopping, such as grocery stores, retail shopping, restaurants, and gas stations. Restaurants in town include Chinese, Mexican, American cuisine, and multiple fast food options.

Industry includes several large manufacturing facilities, such as Modine and Nestle, as well as locallyowned manufacturers, including Global Instruments and Coca-Cola Distribution. Many small businesses and a large agriculture-based economy help support the local Industry. Trenton is entering the renewable energy market with a recently-built solar farm.

Wright Memorial Hospital began treating patients at its new state-of-the-art facility a few years ago. The 25-bed facility includes a nearly 60,000 square foot hospital and adjoining 12,000 square foot medical office building. The hospital is part of the Saint Luke's Health System.

The educational system starts off strong with the AA rated Trenton R-IX School District and offers continuing education with North Central Missouri College. The Jewett Norris Library has over 33,000 volumes within its walls, and the college library has

an additional 15,000 volumes. North Central Missouri College makes higher education accessible and affordable to residents from Trenton and others across the country. NCMC recently completed the Barton Farm Campus for students specializing in agriculture and Cross Hall for students wanting to enter a career in nursing. The Trenton R-IX School District includes S.M. Rissler Elementary, which has instruction for grades K-4; a newer Middle School houses 5-8; and Trenton High School provides education for grades 9-12. There is also pre-school provided by Head Start and other child care providers.

Trenton Municipal Airport is a 4400-foot hard surface lighted runway with jet fuel and hangar space available. Kansas City International Airport is 90 miles away with commercial air transportation.

Located just 96 miles northeast of Kansas City, Trenton lies in an ideal spot for trade and travel. U.S. Highway 65 bypasses the city's east edge, and Highway 6 runs directly through the downtown area, travels through the Amish community of Jamesport, and meets Interstate 35 as it runs on its east-west course.

Evidence of the growth of Trenton in recent years includes new businesses, new homes, and the remodeling of existing structures. North Central Missouri College is involved in a major fundraising campaign for extensive renovation and expansion. Trenton is a city of solid and substantial growth. It is one of the most desirable and attractive small cities in the Midwest.

Monroe Veach was born in Trenton, Missouri in 1896. During World War I, he was assigned to work in the Harness and Saddle Repair Shop at Fort Riley, Kansas where he learned his trade as a master saddle maker. At the end of the war he returned home and opened a small Harness and Saddle shop on his Father's farm. In the early 1920s, Monroe Veach worked as a Trick Roper for Foghorn Clancy's Rodeo at times. While doing this he learned of the great need for Trick Saddles, which became his first niche market, propelling him to fame as a master saddle maker.

NorthCentral MISSOURI COLLEGE



North Central Missouri College is located in Trenton, Missouri, a community that has long valued the benefits of higher education, as college opportunities have been a tradition in Grundy County for more than 150 years. Grand River College, organized in 1850, was the first school west of the Mississippi to open its doors to women. The second institution, Trenton College, opened in 1867, and it was followed by Avalon College in 1890. Ruskin College, organized by Englishman Walter Vrooman, became the center of a socialistic educational experiment in the Trenton area. All these early institutions are defunct.

North Central Missouri College, formerly Trenton Junior College, was founded in 1925 and is the second oldest publicly-supported community college in Missouri. At its inception, it was part of a K-14 education system operated by a joint Board of Education/Board of Trustees and a school superintendent/college president. For more than 40 years the College was located on the top floor of Trenton High School in a building located on East Ninth Street in Trenton. The College shared facilities, administration and staff with the high school in that building, but in 1967 the College moved to the former Central School Building on Main Street near downtown Trenton. That building is now known as Geyer Hall.

Trenton Junior College officially became an independent entity by action of the voters at a municipal election in April 1986, and its first Board of Trustees was sworn in and seated in July 1986. In July 1988, the College's name was changed to North Central Missouri College to better reflect its mission to serve all the citizens in its assigned 16-county service region in northwest Missouri.

Today, North Central Missouri College continues to exemplify the values of higher education traditionally important to the citizens it serves. September 2025 will mark its 100th anniversary.
